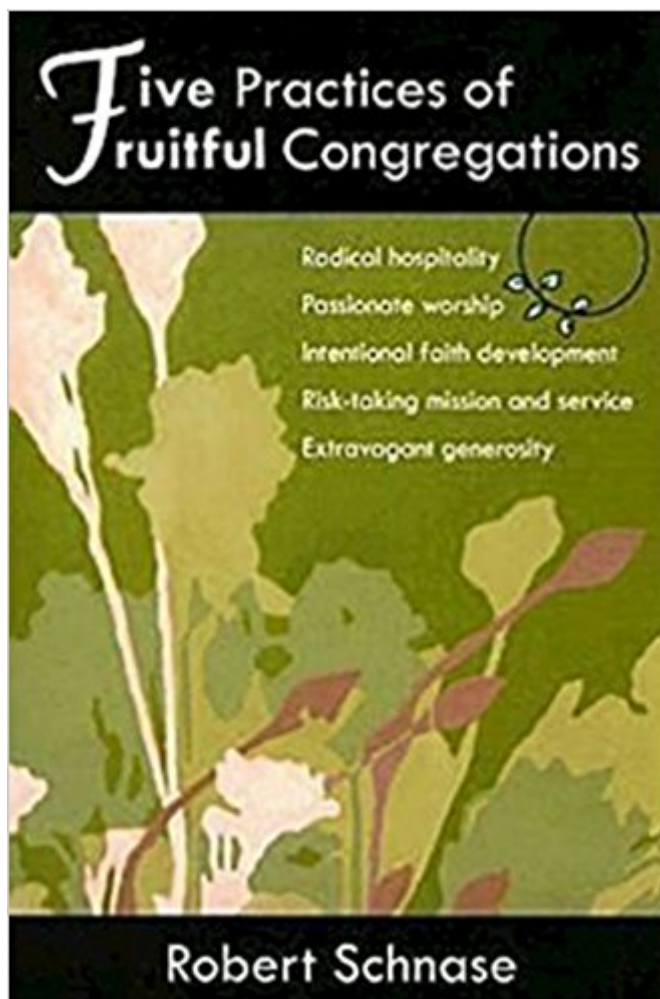

I am using this as a supplement to the current use of Five Practices of Fruitful Living with my elders. My one concern is the expectation that these practices will solve the problem congregations may have of stemming the decline of church attendance and providing a vision for the future of their church. There is a lot of work to be done when trying to keep a church vital and relevant across age groups. This is one way to encourage solidarity and direction, but the leadership has to buy in or agree this is where they think the congregation is ready to go first.

This book fuels the imagination for what churches can be. The author makes the case that healthy, productive churches tend to practice radical hospitality, passionate worship, intentional faith development, risk-taking mission and service, and extravagant generosity. In each chapter he unpacks what each of these practices means and gives several examples of what it looks like. This would make for a good church-wide study. Every church would do well to consider how it is doing in each of these five areas.

This book is absolutely the total package, it gives the church balance in all direction of faith development and worship, radical hospitality. risk-taking and about extravagant generosity. These are all necessary challenges all churches face. Using these guidelines have truly change the way

This book contains information on how churches can enliven their missions by making improvements in five areas. Since these five areas are discussed by other writers in mission improvement, I have reason to believe this book presents a plan that is worthwhile to attempt. We have just received the kit and are reviewing this to see how it can be coordinated with other educational programs and equipping efforts that we are implementing. Probably what a prospective buyer really wants to know is: "Does this work?" I cannot answer that yet, but it sounds like it is worth trying the program. I would suggest buying this book before buying the kit, so that you have an overview of the whole program, anyway.

We did this church-wide and it was fantastic. The five fruits are all important to churches that believe themselves to be like Jesus. We have to worship passionately, be radically hospitable, take risks, and so on and so on. If you want your church to grow spiritually, and find a way to embrace the real spirit of being a Christ follower, read this book. Its anecdotes all revolve around United Methodist congregations, but the practices themselves are Bible-centric, not Methodist-centric or John Wesley-centric. It helps that Wesley himself was Bible-centered.

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
