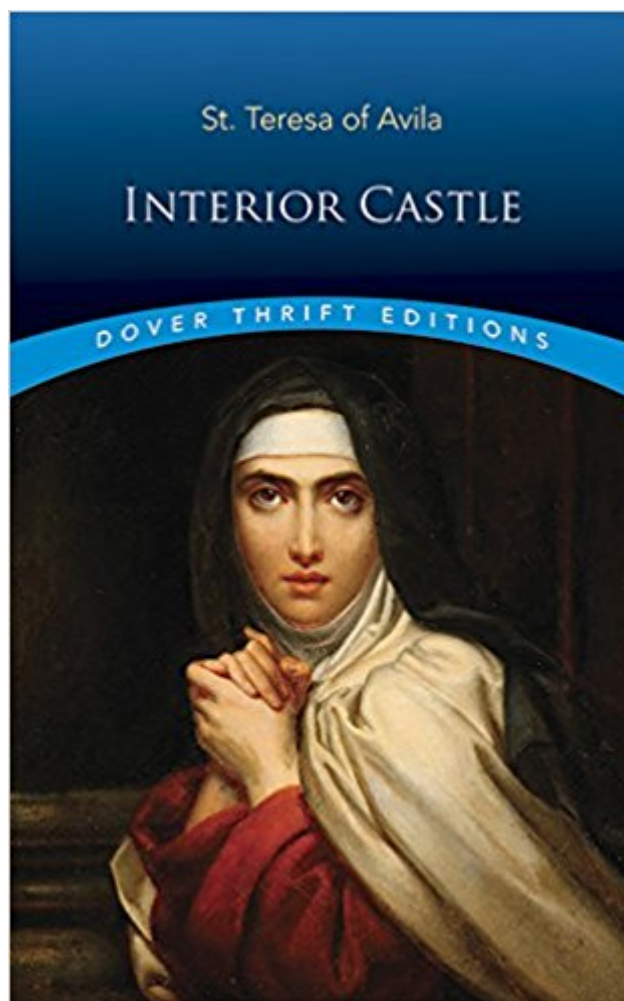

Synopsis

While I was beseeching Our Lord today...I began to think of the soul as if it were a castle made of a single diamond or of very clear crystal, in which there are many rooms, just as in Heaven there are many mansions. — St. Teresa of Avila

A masterpiece of spiritual literature, this sixteenth-century work was inspired by a mystical vision that came upon the revered St. Teresa of Avila, one of the most gifted and beloved religious figures in history. St. Teresa's vision was of a luminous crystal castle composed of seven chambers, or "mansions," each representing a different stage in the development of the soul. In her most important and widely read book, St. Teresa describes how, upon entering the castle through prayer and meditation, the human spirit experiences humility, detachment, suffering, and, ultimately, self-knowledge, as it roams from room to room. As the soul progresses further toward the center of the castle, it comes closer to achieving ineffable and perfect peace, and, finally, a divine communion with God.

A set of rare and beautiful teachings for people of all faiths desirous of divine guidance, this meticulous modern translation by E. Allison Peers breathes contemporary life into a religious classic.

I love this book but I imagine it's not something everyone would enjoy. I'm a Christian but I'm not a Roman-Catholic. I found it an interesting insight into the mind of a 16th century nun, but for me the greatest value of this book is her spiritual perspective on prayer, which is the main theme of the book. She is obviously a seasoned veteran of prayer with great personal experience of communion with God. Reading her accounts of ecstatic experiences and her love of God is inspiring to me, as I'm sure it would be to anyone interested in deepening their relationship with God. There are moments wherein the writing is somewhat clunky and awkward but there are great heights of rapturous communion with God.

I read the Interior Castle while on a trip to Spain where we visited Avila and one of the convents she founded. The biography explains her deep devotion to the Lord and the conflicts it caused this strong and remarkable woman. Seeing some of her accomplishments in person made the story of her life more astonishing.

Although a timeless treasure, this is not always a book that all people can just pick up and read without an introduction. The reason for this is that Saint Teresa is describing her own spiritual and mystical experiences. In a sense, Saint Teresa is laying out the steps, or the course of action, that a person must take to discover all that God has planned for it in the Spiritual Life, right up to Divine union. Likewise, she says, "my intention is only to explain in turn the different experiences which occur on this road." However, throughout the book, she admits there can be gaps of understanding as to what we are reading. She tells us things like, "to explain to you what I should like is very difficult unless you have had personal experience..." or "When this experience comes to you, remember that it belongs to this innermost mansion..." and "Anyone who has experience of this, and possesses more ability than I, will perhaps know how to express it." She also cautions the reader, again from her own experience and what she has known from others, "You will think this absurd, but it is what actually happens..." and also about being prepared, "You will laugh at my saying this and call it ridiculous, for you will all think courage is quite unnecessary...." There are also books like Dr. Susan Muto's [Where Lovers Meet: Inside the Interior Castle](#). This just might be a perfect companion or introduction to Saint Teresa's classic work. Dr. Muto states in the Preface, "There are few spiritual classics as essential to understanding the life of prayer as *The Interior Castle*. Its clarity, order, and beauty are undeniable, yet many readers have asked me to write a "translation" of the translation! I ask them to read this companion text side by side with the *Castle* itself. It is the masterpiece of a mystic whom I consider a personal mentor, of a saint and Doctor of the Church, who has taught as if she were still here." Having long been known for her numerous writings on the Spiritual Life and its formation, Dr. Muto is worth reading along with the *Castle* itself, letting an expert be a guide. Saint Teresa's work, highly regarded by the experts, is a book of richness from which we can benefit greatly. With the above caveat, and on the feast of Saint Teresa of Avila, I highly recommend this great work. May it awaken in all of us the desire to ask the King for the courage to embark or persevere on this journey. Muto describes this as the courage to "open the door and penetrate the depths of this divine dwelling," and the "inner strength and the courage we need to continue our journey despite the obstacles strewn on our path;" because, in the *Interior Castle*, Muto she says Saint Teresa "teaches us the essential lessons we need to learn if we hope to enter heaven." Not bad for starters and the more advanced! I have read it book form previously, but encountered a whole new experience listening to it as an audiobook.

Nothing more can be added to what has already been said in the other reviews. However, I do want to lend my voice in support of this translation by Allison Peers. The *Interior Castle* that I first read was this translation. I still prefer it to all others, although I also enjoy the Kavanaugh translation. I experienced a true conversion of heart reading the "*Interior Castle*," for in it I found validation in the spiritual experiences I had been having up till that point. This is why I heartily recommend this book.

Quotes from Teresa of Avila have always been inspirational to me. The book in its entirety was directed towards her sisters, and was less systematic in its presentation than I would have expected--would be difficult to outline. That being said, it is a classic written by a saint and Doctor of the Church.
