In an era of looking everything up on the Web or using an iPhone app, this is a great guide to have in paper format. This is a well organized guide which divides the city into twelve neighborhoods. Rather than trying to be a comprehensive guide with every restaurant in the city, Michelin selects anywhere from 10 - 40 quality restaurants in each neighborhood. This is also the place to get the scoop on their famous star ratings. There are two restaurants in Chicago with three stars, three restaurants with two stars, and eighteen restaurants with one star. You can also read about which places received their Bib Gourmand (good values for \$40 or less per person) designation. It's a great reference to use when deciding where to go out to eat!

Zagats has become useless lately since it is based on people entering their ratings on the Internet. If I'm to believe the Zagats reviews, then Olive Garden is the best Italian with 'true Italian cuisine' and

Bought this guide based on previous reviews and paired it up with the "Michelin Green Guide..." (also reviewed). Totally let down. Spent 3 days touring Chicago, the books spent 2 in the hotel room. After the first day, we realized that it was difficult to use the guide in "real time" because there were a lot of restaurants that were left out. We weren't willing to waste our limited time to go hunting for a restaurant that was lucky enough to have made it into the book. Of the five restaurants that we ate at, only one was in the guide - Gino's East. Aside from that, we had heard about "Bubba Gump's" on Navy Pier, not in the guide. Looked for the Billy Goat Tavern ("Cheezborger, Cheezborger..." from SNL), not in guide. Saw an add for Ill Forks Steakhouse, not in guide. Several restaurants caught our eye while being tourists, that were also not in the guide (Rock Bottom Grill, Weber Grill). The maps were useful, but so was the free map, "The Magnificent Mile: Area Guide" that we received from the front desk at the hotel (a lot lighter also). We did not use this guide to choose a hotel, as we received it after we booked accommodations. Unless you are going to plan your visit around places that you'd like to eat, save your money and avoid this guide. Note: Also had a chance to glance through the 2012 edition at a bookstore, would give it the same review.

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
