

simplified fashion - My father always led the family Seder. He used an old-school Haggadah (very lengthly), but when the tradition of leading the Seder was passed along to the next generation (my brother and I), we found the old Haggadah too involved. Unlike our father, who knew exactly where to go in the old Haggadah to cover the key parts of the Seder, we spent way to much time searching for what we wanted (and unfortunately, missing much of what we wanted, too). After this experience, I went on-line looking for a simpler Haggadah. I found this one, with a number of good reviews. I ordered one copy, and after looking through it, I have now ordered 15 more. The Haggadah covers the key parts of the Seder, with an emphasis on explanations of the symbolism and meaning of the the things covered in the Seder. For our family, not well-versed in the intricacies of our religion, but certainly wanting to keep this tradition alive, this Haggadah is just right.

--.comExcellent - We usually attend someone else's Passover, but last year the plan changed and I was thrust into the role of Leader of the Seder. We are not a very religious group (some of us are not even Jewish) so we were seeking an experience that would be respectful of tradition and the meaning of Passover while not giving us more detail than we wanted. We did not want some sort of new-age "Passover for Dummies" where the significance and essence of the holiday and its history are dumbed down or lost. We found that this "30 Minute Seder" Haggadah provided exactly the right balance for us. --.com

It's challenging to present a Seder in a concise manner while keeping the entire family engaged. 30minute-Seder takes great care to keep the prayers brief, yet compelling. Since it's nearly impossible to get most families back to the table for the completion of the Seder after dinner, all of the essential components are addressed before the Seder concludes for the festive meal.

This year we ordered a bunch of different haggadot in search of a replacement for our Maxwell House ones. Initially, we liked this one...its thinness was appealing, the pages are bright and colorful and extremely visually engaging, and it didn't include all the extraneous text that makes seders feel so insanely long. But when we really sat down and went through it page by page...we just felt rushed and harried. The pages that at first were so visually engaging now felt like they were trying to pack in as much information as possible in as few pages as possible. Some details or readings we like were too condensed, or omitted entirely. There's virtually no Hebrew, and the book opens like an English book rather than a Hebrew book. The pictures and illustrations all felt very slick and modern...but we didn't feel anything historical or traditional tying us to earlier generations. It made

us feel like the entire purpose of this book was to get through the formality of the seder ASAP to get to the meal...not to relax and enjoy the rich and complex story of Passover.

So close to being a decent stab at a brief haggadah. Inexplicably, despite mentioning at the first handwashing that there's no blessing that time, the second handwashing is completely omitted. There's also no indication of where the meal is supposed to fall, and I don't think there's anything about benching after the meal either. I wondered if I was missing a couple of pages, but they're numbered and there's no gap. Maybe I got a bad printing? Either way, I can only review what ended up in my mailbox. The search for a haggadah that doesn't completely suck continues apace. Weirdly, this also reads left-to-right, page-wise. I get that maybe it's done for accessibility, but it's got Hebrew in it, so I assume the target audience is at least familiar with the idea that Hebrew reads right to left.

The VERY BEST thing about this haggadah was that it is available in Braille!! Our 38-year-old daughter (blind since childhood) could finally read along and participate. The book was also a big improvement over my husband's "edited down" version of our old, very traditional haggadah. We had small grandchildren at our seder so there were interruptions and it probably took us longer than 30 minutes to complete, but this haggadah hits all the important parts of the story, uses plain language and made the Passover story accessible to all.

This was a wonderful booklet and was extremely informative. When you have young children that want to get involved with religious holidays, sometimes observance does not quite inform the depth of religious importance and questions can be difficult to address accurately. This was a wonderful book for my nieces and nephews and was an easy read for them. I enjoyed this book, also.

We liked using the 30 minute seder Haggadah this year - we found it easy to read and understand and it still included the main thrust of the holiday and its significance without sacrificing a lot of the meaning, however shorter. I like that you included the songs and would prefer more songs included. The only thing we had a problem with was the interpretation of the parting of the red sea which the English text you included alludes to happening because of wind. I've never heard that before - the

parting of the red sea happened as an out and out miracle!Thanks - it didn't take 30 minutes, maybe because of our own reading and interruptions, but....it was a good improvement on the longer service.

Perfect for our Seder which has a mix of religious backgrounds and ages. It says all the important things that everyone needs to remember.

This small book was very helpful to me while I explained the significance of Passover to many friends who aren't Jewish. They asked me many questions which were answered in the book and even suggested that we hold a Seder next Passover since it appeared so interesting to them. Being a Secular Jew, I told them that it wasn't likely that I would do that but I'd be happy to share the book with anyone who wanted to try.
