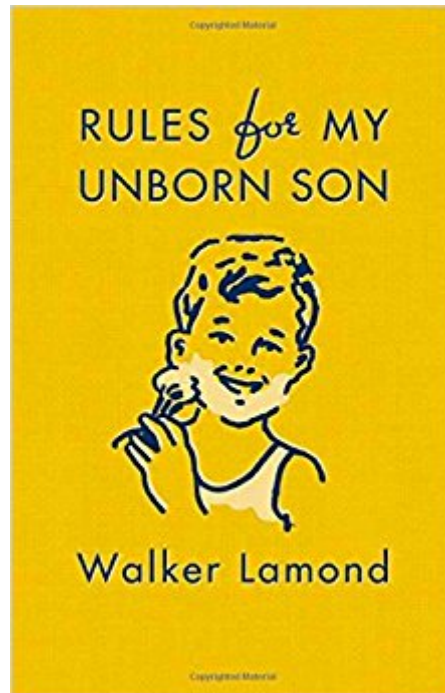

Ironically, some of the quotes are things that I find myself saying variations of on a daily basis to coworkers, friends and family. I bought this as a gift for a couple I'm friends with when they had their first baby boy. They really, really loved it and they have kept it on their coffee table now for two years. I have purchased several copies for my other friends when they have boys as well, and I bought a copy for myself. It's a good read and reminder of how to set a good example with my behavior. I really recommend this book as a gift or even as a bathroom / coffee table book.

Don't buy this as an instruction manual on how to raise a son, but purchase it to start you thinking about parenthood with a healthy serving of laughter along the way.

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
