

I knew there's a reason why I don't really enjoy YA contemporary books as much as the dystopians, fantasy, and sci-fi books. I know these are teenagers and I am not. But I really wished the voice of our main character was a little bit more mature than just a whiney little teenager. In this book, we follow Belly (short for Isabel) and sometimes she's called Bells or Jelly Belly or Belly Button. There you go....a character with multiple pet names makes for an immature girl. Anyway, like I said, Belly spends her summers in Cousins, a kind of fake Hamptons I'm guessing with her two friends she's grown up with every summer. Both of the boys, Conrad and Jeremiah, who are also brothers, are as

different as they can be. Jeremiah is younger and more naive...cheery...always happy. Conrad, the brooding, darker, mysterious older brother and also is the one Belly's been in love with for years. And this summer...the summer Belly turns 16...is also the summer she turns pretty and this is where our series takes off. This book didn't really blow me away because nothing really happens. The story is told through Belly's POV so you see the world through her eyes...as an immature, selfish teenager. It was a story about a little girl who complained constantly about being included, or about crushing over boys, or getting jealous of her best friend getting more noticed by guys while other more important things were crashing down around her. And I really do think Jenny Han did this on purpose. I do think Jenny Han wrote it in a way that other teenagers can relate to. In fact, if I really thought back to my teenage years and put myself in Belly's shoes (and I had to try really hard to do this) I somewhat did relate to her. But this didn't happen often. I wanted a little bit more from all the characters. Belly's obsession with Conrad didn't make sense to me and when things came to a head, when Belly confronted Conrad about his feelings, she mentioned how he was always there for her. But I just didn't get or feel that was the case. The ending was a little bit confusing and abrupt. It seemed like it only served the purpose to connect this book to the sequel. With that said, I am curious to see how this series plays out so I will continue reading. It is a very quick and easy read.
